The common core





The Common Core consists of...

- English Language (GCSE)
- English Literature (GCSE)
- Mathematics (GCSE)
- Science (Combined or Trilogy GCSE)
- Religious Studies (GCSE)
- Core Physical Education (no exam)
- Personal, Social, Health and Economic Education (no exam)

Taking a language is no longer compulsory.





What can I choose to study?

Optional choices



The number of free option choices your child will be able to take is dependent on their science route.

- If they select trilogy science they will be able to make 3 further option choices.
- If they select **combined** science they will be able to make 4 further option choices.

It is important to remember that in both science routes students will study Biology, Chemistry and Physics and they will be able to continue to study science post 16.

What is the EBacc?

The EBacc is not a qualification in its own right – it's a combination of GCSE subjects, including a language, that offer a range of knowledge and skills.

While your son or daughter may not have decided on their future career path yet, choosing the EBacc at GCSE gives them access to a full range of employment options when they leave school. Also if they are thinking of going to university, the EBacc is recommended by Britain's most prestigious universities.



EBacc subjects

- English language and English literature
- Maths
- Science

Combined science or 3 single sciences from Biology, Chemistry, Physics, and Computer science

- History or Geography
- A language Ancient or modern

Why have we made languages non compulsory?

At Haydon we believe students should study subjects which match their interests and skills, meeting their aspirations for the future. As a result we have made studying a language non compulsory.

However studying a foreign language can be extremely rewarding and exciting. They provide an insight into other cultures and can open the door to employment opportunities, broadening pupils' horizons, helping them flourish in new environments. The Russell Group has named languages as subjects that open doors to more degrees at universities. (The Russell Group is a group of 24 universities with a shared focus on research and a reputation for academic achievement)



Advice regarding selecting the right subjects.





Think about the type of course it is - does it have coursework or a practical assessment element?

Consider keeping as many paths open as possible, pick a range of subjects from different areas, which will develop different skills and knowledge.



However, if your child has a specific career in mind, undertake some research to find out if any GCSEs or applied subjects are necessary or advisable.

Make choices for the right reasons; you are more likely to succeed this way, pick what you think you will enjoy.

What happens now?
