- Experience student life




Which Subject?



Choices of university and subject

- Maximum of 5 choices
- Consider entrance requirements carefully:
 - 1 or 2 choices higher than realistic predicted grades
 - 2-3 choices around predicted grades
 - 1-2 safeguards of lower grade offers
- Entrance tests / Interviews

What about the cost?



Choosing University will be the most expensive option and courses often charge up to \pounds 9,250 per year of study, but it is important to understand what support you will receive to cover this.

Tuition fee loans - cover the full cost of your course, are paid directly to the course provider, and you won't have to pay it back until after your course, when you're earning above a certain level.

Maintenance loans - can be applied for at the same time, lending you money at the start of each term to help with living expenses. How much you get depends on your household income, where you study, where you live and how long for. As with Tuition fee loans you won't have to pay it back until after your course, when you're earning above a certain level.

Levels of apprenticeship



Apprenticeship Type	Value of qualification	Equivalent to academic study	Typical entry Requirements
Degree Apprenticeship	Level 6 & 7	Bachelors degree or Masters degree	A Levels (UCAS points score)
Higher Apprenticeship	Level 4 & 5	Certificate of Higher education or Diploma of Higher Education	A Levels (UCAS points score)
Advanced Apprenticeship	Level 3	2 A Levels or IB	GCSE 9-4
Intermediate Apprenticeship	Level 2	5 GCSEs A*-C	GCSE pass at 3 - 1

Universities offer their degree apprentices exactly the same student experience as other students, so you will still have access to the student union, sports facilities, student discounts etc.

With an apprenticeship, you gain the competitive advantage of gaining at least 3 years' work experience whilst completing your degree.

But remember – it's hard work as a degree apprentice. You'll be working full time **and** fitting in the equivalent of a full time degree alongside it. It might take a bit longer, 4 years instead of 3, but you'll achieve exactly the same degree.


