People with symptoms of a respiratory infection including COVID	 Staff, parents, students and visitors are informed of the national guidance regarding self-isolation from the UKHSA. For children and young people 18 and under: Children and young people with mild symptoms such as a runny nose, sore throat, or slight cough, who are otherwise well, car continue to attend their education setting. Children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with othe people, where they can. They can go back to school, college of childcare, and resume normal activities when they no longer have a high temperature and they are well enough to attend. It is not recommended that children and young people are tested for COVID-19 unless directed to by a health professional. If a child or young person has a positive COVID-19 test result they should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 3 days after the day they took the test, if they can. Children and young people who usually go to school, college of childcare and who live with someone who has a positive COVID-19 test result should continue to attend as normal. 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Contact with individuals who develop coronavirus symptoms at school		 Students going home after displaying symptoms who are awaiting collection by a parent are moved away from others to a location that can be ventilated. If the student needs to use the toilet while awaiting collection, they use a separate bathroom if possible. The bathroom is cleaned and disinfected using standard cleaning products before being used by anyone else. Anyone who comes into contact with a symptomatic individual washes their hands thoroughly for 20 seconds with soap and running warm water or hand sanitiser. The area around the symptomatic individual is cleaned and appropriately ventilated after they have left the premises. 				
Managing respiratory infections, including coronavirus	Н	 Staff with symptoms of a respiratory infection, including coronavirus, who have a high temperature and do not feel well enough to work will be advised to staff and home and avoid contact with others until they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to return to work.
