Pupil Premium 2013/14 (Financial year)

The Pupil Premium is a sum of money the school receives for each student who is either:

- 1. Currently in receipt of Free School Meals (FSM) (£900)
- 2. Been in receipt of FSM anytime in the last 6 years (Ever6) (£900)
- 3. Looked after Children 6 months or longer (£900)
- 4. The service premium gives schools extra funding to support children and young people with parents in the armed forces. Pupils attract the premium if they meet the following criteria: (£300)
 - one of their parents is serving in the regular armed forces
 - one of their parents served in the regular armed forces in the last 3 years
 - one of their parents died while serving in the armed forces and the pupil is in receipt of a pension under the Armed Forces Compensation Scheme (AFCS) and the War Pensions Scheme (WPS)

The government believes that the pupil premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and their peers by ensuring that the funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most.

The aim of the money is to try to close the attainment gap. School have autonomy over how they spend this money but they are required to ensure that it is spent on projects and interventions that support students from low-income households to achieve equally as well as their peers.

Outcomes

Our primary outcome is to improve the level of attainment for Pupil Premium students until it is on a par with the rest of the school cohort. Key performance indicators are our Year 11 GCSE cohort. The following data is from the DfE. It should be noted that the DFE figures for pupil premium in 2013 did not include 3 students that were included in school figures. One Services child, the other 2 missed the January census. The DfE figures also included 5 students that were off roll but included in the January census.

The headline figure is that 44% (DfE), 51% (School data) of Haydon School Pupil Premium students achieved 5 A*-C grades at GCSE in comparison with 40.7% nationally. Nationally, the gap between students eligible for the pupil premium and those not eligible is widening. An analysis of recently-published GCSE results from 2012/13 by the think tank Demos reveals a 0.3% increase in the national attainment gap, which now stands at 26.7%. At Haydon Pupil Premium students still did not perform as well as the remainder of the cohort but the gap is 26% (DfE) and only 19% with Haydon's figures. We are working hard to reduce this gap through many interventions.

Each year group is analyzed and data from teacher assessment compared to the rest of the year group for Pupil Premium students. Our interventions start from years 7.
