Year 6 Transition Summer School (24 to 28 July 2023)

We have around 200 Year 6 students, who will join us in September, signed up for our Transition Summer School. We are delighted to have the opportunity of ensuring these students have a really positive first experience of Haydon School. We have planned a full week of activities – each student will receive a curriculum comprising English, Maths, Science and PE team building activities and other enrichment lessons. Integral to the schemes of work will be the Haydon Values and one of our main aims is to ensure students make new friends and get to know the school environment. We have a great team of staff who are really looking forward to giving the students a positive, fun learning experience, which will serve as an excellent transition to Haydon from their primary school. On the last day, parents will be invited to a Barbeque and celebrate the achievements of their children during the week.

Site Improvements over the summer holidays

There is a significant number of building improvements taking place over the summer holidays to improve the facilities for the students and staff when they return in September:

A-Level Results Thursday 17th August and GCSE Results Thursday 24th August 2023

All results will be available to pick up in person from the Sixth Centre to Year 13 students on Thursday 17 August and to Year 11 students on Thursday 24 August from around 8.15 onwards. We are really looking forward to celebrating the success of our students with them. For Year 11, the Sixth Form team will be on hand throughout the morning to make the process of enrolment as simple as possible. Enrolling online should only be done due to pre-booked holidays or emergencies that mean attending in person is impossible. We really look forward to celebrating with Year 11 and welcoming our students back to Sixth Form. New School Year

We have slightly altered the structure of the school day next year, and moved 10 minutes from period 1 (which is currently seventy minutes long) to form time at the end of the day, which will make form time half an hour, and will allow for form tutors to effectively deliver an impactful activity for the students. Form time is a section of the day students often view differently to other lessons during the day, but it is a vital part of their education, and time in which we are able to deliver character education, help develop social skills, and allow students to improve the soft skills vital for progression when they leave school. This means the school day will run in the following way:

As a reminder of our return dates for September, Monday 4th September is an inset day for staff only, Years 7 & 12 return to school on Tuesday 5th, and all other year groups return on Wednesday 6th September.






The contractors have started working on the school's building work. The project will involve the installation of solar panels on the roof of St Nicks, St Mary's and the Dobson Buildings. We are hoping that the energy generated will be able to power heating and air conditioning units that will be installed in all classrooms, creating an environment much more conducive to learning, particularly in the warmer summer months that we now seem to get every year. I am also hoping to see a significant reduction in the school's energy costs which currently are very high, leaving more money left over to support student learning.



The week before May half term, forty year 9 students went to the south of France for a week to complete a mixture of land and water based activities. This has been our first overseas trip since the Covid pandemic. The international trips programme used to be a real strength of the school and it is a relief to get these underway again. The group stayed in a town called Morzine, not far from the border of Switzerland where the scenery was beautiful - a mix of sunny green hills and snow capped mountains. The students completed activities such as tree top activities and zip line, rock climbing, kayaking, survival skills and whitewater rafting which was incredible. On one of the days, students completed a 8km hike up and down a mountain to the border of Switzerland. This was very challenging but all students completed it during some difficult weather conditions - sunny at the bottom and cold and snow at the top! Our students behaved very well. What is a **Young Carer?**

At least one in ten children in Britain has some level of responsibility as a carer in their home. This equates to there being, on average, two or three young carers in every classroom in Britain.

A young carer is someone under the age of eighteen who provides regular support to a parent, sibling or even a grandparent because they are ill, frail, disabled, living with a long-term condition, have a mental illness or abuse substances such as drugs and alcohol.

Young carers come from a range of family situations which can include caring for a sibling with autism or other additional needs, a parent with Schizophrenia or depression, a parent with a physical disability or even an elderly grandparent who lives in the family home.

Young carers (YC's) can have a whole range of responsibilities including household chores such as cooking and cleaning, budgeting, managing medication and liaising with professionals on behalf of their cared for person. Some YC's have to take younger siblings to school before they get to school themselves which can

A large percentage of our YC's are from single parent families which means they are often the sole source of emotional support for the parent. Parents can put their issues and anxieties onto their children which has mental health implications for them too.


